
Princess in Black (series) by Shannon Hale & Dean Hale


Fly Guy (series) by Tedd Arnold


The Penny Books (and others) by Kevin Henkes


Dragon Masters


Dory Fantasmagory


Geronimo and Thea Stilton

The Bad Guys by Aaron Blabey




What We'll Build Oliver Jeffers


Flat Cat by Tara Lazar


A Friend for Eddy by Ann Kim Ha


Amy Wu by Kat Zhang

One World 24 Hours on Planet Earth by Nicola Davies

As the clock strikes twelve, two sisters are spirited away on a journey to glimpse, in the span of a moment, extraordinary biodiversity: a mother polar bear and her cubs hunting seals in Svalbard, tiny turtles in India following the moon toward the sea, and enormous whale sharks gulping plankton in the Philippines.
